Alabama Department of Industrial Relations Obtaining Convictions for Unemployment Compensation Fraud

MONTGOMERY – Alabama Department of Industrial Relations Director Tom Surtees announced today that the Department has successfully prosecuted several Alabamians for unemployment compensation fraud. The following individuals were charged with violating the Alabama Unemployment Compensation Law by making false statements in claims for benefits.

- Angela C. Oden, of Tuscaloosa, was tried in Tuscaloosa County District Court on January 6, 2010. An investigation by the Industrial Relations Benefit Payment Control Section determined that Oden received a total of \$1,244.00 in benefits to which she was not entitled.

Oden was found guilty and sentenced to six months in jail, which was suspended for two years, and ordered to pay restitution in the amount of benefits received illegally.

- Tony Fitzpatrick, of Tuskegee, was tried in Macon County District Court on March 10, 2010. An investigation by the Industrial Relations Benefit Payment Control Section determined that Smith received a total of \$1,895.00 in benefits to which he was not entitled.

Fitzpatrick pled guilty and was sentenced to six months in jail, which was suspended for 12 months. He was also ordered to pay court costs and restitution in the amount of benefits received illegally.

- David H. Mahaffey, Jr., of Oxford, was tried in Calhoun County District Court on March 1, 2010. An investigation by the Industrial Relations Benefit Payment Control Section determined that Mahaffey received a total of \$4,395.00 in benefits to which he was not entitled.

Mahaffey was found guilty and was sentenced to 12 months in jail, which was suspended for 24 months. He was also fined \$100.00 and ordered to pay court costs and restitution in the amount of benefits received illegally.

“We at the Department of Industrial Relations want people to know that we are aggressively pursuing cases of unemployment compensation fraud,” said Surtees. “Especially in these economic times, we want to make sure that all who are entitled to benefits receive them. But at the same time, we will not allow those who deliberately try to defraud the system to go unpunished. We are working with local District Attorney Offices to make sure that we can identify and prosecute those individuals who are committing these crimes.”
